




MYTH: A tornado hits your town and generates a lot of debris. FEMA and MEMA will be there soon to pick up the debris.



MYTH: A tornado hits your town and generates a lot of debris. FEMA and MEMA will be there soon to pick up the debris.

TRUTH: Neither FEMA or MEMA will pick up your debris. It is the legal responsibility of the local government. If the storm is large enough for a federal declaration, FEMA can reimburse your local government for debris cleanup. Unfortunately, if the storm is not big enough to bring about a federal declaration, then the city/town must look to the county and volunteers for assistance.



MYTH: A large, privately owned company has significant damage in your city. FEMA will reimburse the city if the state asks for a federal declaration.

TRUTH: Privately owned businesses do not qualify for Public Assistance (governmental entities) Grant. Those businesses MAY be eligible for assistance from the Small Business Administration (SBA) if there is an SBA declaration.



**INDIVIDUAL** Assistance is provided by the Federal Government (FEMA) directly to eligible **INDIVIDUALS** and **FAMILIES** who have sustained losses due to disasters.

<u>PUBLIC</u> Assistance can reimburse <u>GOVERNMENTAL ENTITIES AND</u> <u>CERTAIN PRIVATE NON-PROFITS</u> for debris removal, emergency protective measures, and infrastructure repairs or replacement needed due to disaster-related damages of governmental property.

## Step #2: County/City Begins Damage Assessments

The <u>LOCAL</u> government conducts the initial damage assessments (IDA), shares damage information with the state, and participates in the joint preliminary damage assessment (PDA).










- Based on the 2020 Census.

- •If MS does not reach \$5,241,2464 (uninsured or under-insured), then no federal disaster for PA.
- ■If County does not reach the \$4.44 per capita then that county's numbers don't count.










## Step #3: MEMA Validates Damage Assessments

The <u>state</u> government reviews the damages submitted by the counties/municipalities to decide whether to request a joint damage assessment with FEMA.





## Step #4: MEMA must request Joint Preliminary Damage Assessments with FEMA

MEMA must request Joint Preliminary Damage Assessments with FEMA for <u>specific</u> counties that have reached their threshold of eligible damages.

SUBJECT: Request for Joint Preliminary Damage Assessments for <u>Public Assistance</u> Lee and Pontotoc Counties – March 31 – April 1, 2023, Storms

The State of Mississippi is requesting Joint Preliminary Damage Assessments (JPDAs) for <u>Public Assistance</u> for two (2) counties: Lee and Pontotoc. Additional counties may be requested based on continuing evaluations.

On March 31, 2023, the State experienced significant impacts from Severe Storms, Straight-line Winds, and Tornadoes. As these systems crossed into Mississippi, they caused a tremendous quantity of debris and significant power outages across the northern portion of the State. Hit significantly hard were Lee and Pontotoc Counties. While there were many houses damaged, those numbers are not above the ability of the State to handle. The Public Assistance impacts were much greater. Due to the nature of the storm and the proximity of these two (2) counties, we request one (1) team along with an Insurance Specialist for the Assessments to begin on Thursday, April 27, 2023.

# Step #6: MEMA Drafts Request for Federal Assistance

FEMA provides their data- driven numbers to the State. If data supports declaration request, then MEMA drafts a request for the Governor.

Step #7: Governor Signs the Request and Sends to the President

The deadline to request a Federal Declaration is 30-days from end date of the storm.





# Step #8: President Determines Whether or Not to Issue a Declaration

Time Frame is not given. 3 hours to 3 months.






#### Step #9: If APPROVED, then Federal Assistance if Given

If approved, then FEMA implements the programs specified by the President. Declarations specify **COUNTIES.** 







- Prepare your employees and citizens.






